Misinformation, or the accusation of it, has badly warped this generation's understanding of truth. It began with President Trump's accusations of "fake news" and then morphed into "misinformation" in the Covid era. Of course, propaganda and lies have always been mixed into the truth of every era. Even so, our time feels particularly rife with it.

Last month, I was corrected by a conference official for my phrasing in my newsletter article. She thought I was speaking with more certainty than the moment afforded. I augmented some words and addressed it from the pulpit.
